RECTOR'S thoughts

This month's column is written by Assistant Rector Father Mac Stewart while Father Mark is on vacation.

Renewed in Christ

Engraved over the stone archway that leads to the chapel at my seminary were the words, "Be transformed by the renewing of your minds." They were fitting words for seminarians to read every day, a helpful reminder that the new knowledge with which we were filling our minds through sacred study was all intended to lead to our own renewal in faithfulness to Jesus Christ.

But the broader context from which this scriptural text comes suggests that genuine renewal in Christ is about far more than simply gaining new knowledge. "Do not be conformed to this world," says St. Paul, "but be transformed by the renewal of your minds, that you may prove what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Romans 12:2). Seeking genuine renewal in accordance with the will of God involves living a new kind of life: we are not to be conformed to the world but transformed into the image of Christ. That means not simply learning new ideas, but also seeing that our lives in Christ take on a different form than the tired old lifestyle of the rest of the world.

Paul expands on this elsewhere when he calls the Ephesians to "be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and put on the new nature, created after the likeness of God in true right-eousness and holiness" (Ephesians 4:23-24). Paul calls Christians to allow the truth of Christ to become visibly manifest in the way we live our lives, almost like a new form of clothing. Our lives, both as individual Christians and as Christian communities, should shine with the joy and love, the mercy and devotion – "true righteousness and holiness" – of Christ.

We should be precise here, though. It is not simply that Christians ought to be nice people. Many non-Christians turn away from the faith because they expect to find in the church only nice people, and when they don't, they imagine that this is sufficient grounds for dismissing the whole thing. But Christianity has never claimed to deal only with nice people. Jesus did not hang around people that were already upright and respectable. He hung around people whose lives needed

a complete renewal. As C. S. Lewis put it in Mere Christianity, Christianity is not about confirming nice people in their niceness, but about making "new men." It's not about, as he says, teaching a horse to jump better and better but about turning a horse into a winged creature. God wants to make us, in a sense, a whole new kind of being; not just better people, but sons and daughters of God.

And that is what the Church is for. The Church is the place where God continually puts on us the new nature that he has made for us. He does this through all the ways that the Church is called to be the Church: through our celebration of the sacraments, our reading and studying of Scripture, our fellowship with one another, and our reaching out to relieve the necessities of the poor. These are the ways that Christ renews us in his Church, the conduits through which he sends his Holy Spirit to us, not just to make us feel better about ourselves, but to make us holy.

The mission of the Church doesn't stop there, of course. Jesus calls us to share in his renewal of the whole world outside the church's walls by proclaiming the good news of his salvation in word and deed and thereby bringing more and more people into the depths of his healing embrace. But in order to share fully in that work of universal renewal, we need first to have a deep sense of the renewal that Christ has brought and is bringing to our own lives. We need to put on fully the new nature he has given us.

It was with this in mind that our Vestry, at its retreat in February, discerned that during this program year, our parish would undertake a concerted focus on renewing our own spiritual life as a congregation. We want our individual and collective Christian lives to glow with the radiance of "righteousness and holiness," to take on a form that is deeply compelling to the outsider not just by our niceness, but by the way we honor and obey the Lord, grow in faith and hope, and care for one another and our community in sacrificial love.

As one step in this process, we will in the coming months be implementing a congregational resource that has been put continued on page 9

Over the years, I've written a good bit of commentary on refined sacred music and its relevance to our spiritual lives and sacrifices of praise. My convictions grow stronger on its worth, even after so many decades of working in the Church where, in some corners, that's not always the view. Happily, I was mentored wisely early on in these matters and I intend to continue my own efforts of educating and encouraging all ages, especially the young, of that worth. And, once again, let me hasten to add that the support by this parish of my own endeavors is not lost on me. That certainly is a primary reason why I've been here nearly a quarter of a century now!

Of course, the musical arts are not the only compelling expressions of our life and faith, and perhaps that's overlooked sometimes. Obviously, words in the form of prayers, poems, and instruction (e.g. sermons, Bible study, etc.) are the very bedrock from which rise our Christian insights and on which we construct our visual expressions of the

same. My time at Wells in July reminded me of that, as it seems always to do, as treasured liturgical texts articulated in such a beautiful and long-standing edifice ad orned with exquisite tapestries, statues, and stained glass conspire to attest to their collective worth – over the centuries and, thankfully, even now.

That's all a prelude to inviting you to our first Music at Eventide event this Fall Term. We will mark our Patronal Feast on October 7th with a 5 o'clock evensong in the church, followed by a parish supper in St Francis Hall with the annual **Evening of**



Response to this chronic need bubbled up from groups around the parish, working with one another to bring a bit of respite to our neighbors and share some fellowship together. On July 7, the MSF and Youth brought a 'Fourth' cookout to The National Center for Children and Families (aka Greentree Shelter) in Bethesda. Stalwarts from the WSF and Parish Outreach Committee again provided hearty casseroles to the Loaves and Fishes feeding program at St. Stephen's and the Incarnation on July 27-28. As this issue of Sounds goes to print, the Youth have been collecting shelf-stable food items to bring when they go to serve at Manna





Food Center on August 14. And in this column, the Parish Outreach Committee thanks those who dodged the thunderstorms to prepare bag lunches and dinners for the Interfaith Works Women's Center on July 23-24.

Interfaith Works Women's Center (formerly Community Based Shelter) in Rockville is well known to St. Francis; many parishioners have joined in to prepare lunches and dinners



to its transitionally housed female residents since we began providing a week's meals there eighteen-years ago. The annual "St. Francis Week" there (timed as a Lenten service opportunity) sees a few new recruits every time we serve. Summer meal coverage becomes spotty, as volunteers go on vacation while

residents do not, so our two-day stint in July helped fill in the gaps. The Parish Outreach committee shopped for lunch supplies and some needed provisions: seasonal fruit, breakfast items, paper and cleaning supplies. Caroline and Kate Schneider joined Fr. decorated bag lunches one night, with Pat Bernard and Mary Sexton staffing the lunch

And Ongoing: Hunger Fund of the Diocese of Washington

This 'welcome back' edition of Sounds seems an appropriate time for a reminder of why, on the second Sunday of each month, envelopes marked "Hunger Fund" appear in your



service bulletins. They're intended quietly to prompt a donation, however small, to the Hunger Fund of the Diocese of Washington. The Hunger Fund Committee grants approximately \$50,000 annually to under-

funded organizations dedicated to the feeding of homeless and low-income families and individuals within our diocese, a number of which are based in Montgomery County. Grant monies may be spent only on food or the purchase of items directly related to food service: no funds may be used for gas, overhead, or salaries.

Although it is a standing committee of the Diocese, the Hunger Fund receives no line-item support from the diocesan budget, relying solely on support from participating parishes. St. Francis historically has led the diocese in this effort, and the need consistently outpaces incoming contributions. Please be as faithful as you can in returning those envelopes continued on page 11_

Beginning in September, Fr. Mark and Fr. Mac will be offering a five-part course, "Life in the Spirit," designed for those interested in becoming members of St. Francis. There are three venues by which those who have been baptized elsewhere may become full members of St. Francis, Potomac Parish: Confirmation, Reception from the Roman Catholic, Orthodox or Anglican churches, or Transfer of existing membership in another Episcopal parish. Whether you're a teen or an adult, and even if your mind is not yet fully made up about becoming an official member on the rolls of this parish, please do plan to participate as we're certain the classes will help resolve any questions and enrich your worship here. Classes will meet in Kincaid Library at 10:30am and cover the following:

9/16: The Gospel and Creeds 9/23: The Word of God (the Bible)

9/30: The Sacramental Life (the Sacraments of the Church)

10/7: The Anglican Tradition 10/14: Life in Your Parish

Those preparing for confirmation or reception also will be required to attend "Boot Camp for the Soul," a half-day session of intensive teaching and reflective time focusing on Confirmation, the Gifts of the Spirit and Disciplines of Spiritual life. "Boot Camp" will be offered twice to accommodate individual schedules, on Saturday 9/22 and Saturday 10/13 from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm, with lunch following. For those becoming members by transfer, attendance is most welcome but not required.

Candidates will be presented for Confirmation or Reception at the Cathedral on the morning of Saturday November 3 at 10:00 am and recognized by the congregation during the 9:15 service on Sunday November 4; new members by transfer also will be recognized at that time.

If you are not certain of your status, or would like to talk further, please seek out Fr. Mark or Fr. Mac, or simply come along to the first session of this exploration of life in this denomination and parish.

Here are the dates and selections for the upcoming 2018 Women of St. Francis Book Club meetings, which are open to all. We generally meet at 11:30am on the first Tuesday of the month, with a few exceptions. Upcoming books:

September 11: "The Hunger" by Alma Katsu, 2018. Discussion led by the author, who is Margaret Riddle's cousin. Book Synopsis: The tragedy of the Donner Party is retold with a supernatural twist in "The Hunger", a dark mix of historical fiction and horror. For context, in the May of 1846 a wagon train led by George Donner and James Reed set out from Independence, Missouri like so many other pioneer families hoping to settle a new life in California. Instead of following the typical route, however, the Donner Party opted to travel the new Hastings Cutoff, encountering poor terrain and other difficulties that slowed them down considerably, until they became trapped in heavy snowfall somewhere in the Sierra Nevada mountain range. Many of the party died, and some of the survivors allegedly resorted to cannibalism to stay alive.



October 2: We will be reading "The Tsar of Love and Techno" by Anthony Marra. The discussion will be led by Louise G. Amazon Review: "This stunning, ex-

quisitely written collection introduces a cast of remarkable characters whose lives intersect in ways both life-affirming and heartbreaking. And great sacrifices are made in the name of an oil landscape unremarkable except for the almost incomprehensibly peaceful past it depicts."

Adult Forums and Sunday School resume on September 16th after the 9:15am service. To begin our program year, we have two concurrent adult forums. We hope you will find them engaging and enlightening.

Christianity in the Global South: We will explore the practice of Christianity in Asia, Africa and Latin America, the regions where our faith is growing most rapidly, and where it often seems to have the greatest vitality. Our region continues to grow in ethnic diversity, and learning more about global Christianity is also a way to grow in our understanding of our neighbors. We will explore issues like the way Christians read the Bible in the Global South, the role of miracles and spiritual gifts in Global South Christianity, the relationship between church and state in the Global South and the impact of of the Global South on Western Christianity and the future of the Church. Guest speakers will include Philippe Nassif of In Defense of Christians, who will speak about the persecution of believers in the Middle East, Robert Heaney of Virginia Theological Seminary's Center for Anglican Communion Studies, who will speak about Anglicanism in the Global South and a panel of local lay Christians who have immigrated from the Global South who will talk about their experiences. This series will run for 8 weeks, from September 16th through November 11th. There will be no class on 10/21.

Life in the Spirit, a class for new members, includes 5 sessions that will be held September 16th through October 14th. The course will discuss the core beliefs and basic practices of the Christian faith, the Anglican tradition and life at Saint Francis. All those who wish to become members of St. Francis should take the class.

Additional half-days of reflection called "Boot Camp for the Soul" will be held on September 22nd or October 13th. Those who wish to be confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church (including youth) should attend one of these sessions.

We will present candidates for confirmation and reception at the Diocesan Confirmation Service in the National Cathedral on Saturday, November $3^{\rm rd}$ at 10:00am. We will also receive new members (those who are joining St. Francis by letter of transfer from other congregations) at the 9:15am Service on November $4^{\rm th}$.

Georgetown Hill Early School will be our new long-term tenant, beginning in early summer of 2019. Georgetown Hill Early School (GHES) is an experienced, successful, family-owned operator of preschools in the area. They have been in business since 1980 and currently have 8 locations in Montgomery County serving more than 1200 students in preschool thru K, including before-school, after-school, holiday and vacation programs. They have impressed us with their professionalism and expertise in the preschool field, as well as their success and stability. Here are the major terms of our relationship with GHES:

Term: The lease term is 10 to 20 years, with a 10-year minimum and two 5-year options to renew. This long-term relationship establishes a solid and reliable foundation for church finances.

Rent: The new monthly rent is a significant increase over what we currently receive. As is common practice for commercial tenants, the rent builds up to the full level over three years. GHES additionally will pay 75% of our utilities, a substantially higher proportion than is the case at present. This includes electric, sewer, water and gas. GHES also will pay 75% of the cost of maintaining the church grounds, including janitorial, landscaping, solid waste disposal, recycling, and snow removal costs.

Parking: Similar to today, churchgoers will have the use of the parking lots on Sundays and Holidays, but during the school week certain areas have been set aside for pickup/drop off of students to mitigate any impact on neighboring properties. GHES and St. Francis will work together to accommodate occasional or extraordinary uses of the parking lots, such as monthly church group meetings, weddings, and funerals.

Signage: St. Francis retains significant editorial control, including number and placement, over GHES's signage, not only to avoid the current brand or identity confusion, but also for the proper administration of the church's overall mission, character, and reputation.

We are confident this will be a successful, mutually beneficial and long-term relationship. Please plan to come to a presentation on September 9th after the 9:15am service, where Peter Cromwell, the CEO of GHES, will make a short presentation about GHES and he and I will answer your questions.

Loaves and Fishes

Loaves and Fishes began as an outgrowth of St. Stephen and the Incarnation Episcopal Church's practice in the mid-1960s of providing meals after Sunday services. Members of the community started coming for meals. As the program grew, other churches stepped in to help, and now a partnership with 11 other churches as well as diverse foundations, community groups, and individuals sustains it.

The need for free meals is particularly acute on weekends when most free meal programs in Washington are closed.



For the poor and the homeless, finding the next meal is a seven-day-a-week challenge. Guest surveys last year and in previous years regularly show that most guests appreciate not only the food, which is generally

rated as high quality, but also the welcoming, calm surroundings, an opportunity to be off the streets for a while and perhaps have a game of spades or checkers while waiting for the meal. St. Francis has committed to help in months with a fifth Sunday. Here is the upcoming schedule:

RevewalWorks

As you may know, St. Francis is beginning the RenewalWorks program this fall. Vestry members Clay Hough and Sandy Gaddy are heading this effort, which consists of a parish-wide survey to be taken in September followed by several workshops to discern next steps based on the survey data. All this work will generate a report which will then be shared with the parish. A team of parishioners have volunteered to help with the program and we are very grateful to them.

WHAT IS RENEWALWORKS?

A ministry of Forward Movement, RenewalWorks encourages churches to chart a course marked by deeper spiritual growth through a growing love of God and neighbor. When Jesus was asked what must be done to inherit eternal life, his answer was simple, even if it wasn't always easy. He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself" (Luke 10:27). The key to vitality in spiritual life has not changed, and it holds the key to changing our own lives, our churches, and our world.

The RenewalWorks program asks and leads us to begin to answer two questions: How can we move forward in changing times? What are we called to do, and to be? It offers a way for congregations to address these questions by remembering Jesus' basic teaching, reconnecting with a call to discipleship, focusing on growing hearts, and transforming the church, one person at a time.



PARISHIONER SURVEY


The process begins with an anonymous, confidential, and thought-provoking online survey called the Spiritual Life Inventory (SLI) which congregants are invited and encouraged to complete. The SLI explores participants' spiritual life and the church's role in supporting it. RenewalWorks then compares our survey data with data from more than ten years of research (aggregate data from 1,800 churches, including 500,000 congregants and 100+ Episcopal congregations, that reveal key characteristics and best practices of vital congregations). The SLI official launch date is September 16th and we will provide a link to the parish prior to that date. The SLI survey will take 30 minutes and will be available to the congregation over 3 weeks and 4 Sundays, closing midnight October 7. Let us know if you don't have access to a computer.

THE WORKSHOPS

A workshop team will use our SLI findings to explore spiritual growth opportunities for St Francis. Using a guided methodology, the Workshop Team meets to consider research-based best practices and explore how those practices might take root in our congregation.

Workshop 1: Where have we been? This workshop explores the spiritual journey. The spiritual continuum with its four distinct stages is described, along with the catalysts that get us moving toward a deeper spiritual life. These serve as a basis for understanding the inventory findings in upcoming workshops.

Workshop 2: Where are we now? This workshop addresses the first half of the report from our SLI. The data is summarized several ways and bench-



marked against the more than 1,800 churches that have taken the survey. The resulting profile of our spiritual health and vitality provides a clear picture of where we are now as well as a baseline for planning future growth initiatives.

Workshop 3: Where do we feel called to go?

This workshop addresses the second half of the Spiritual Life Inventory report and best practice principles identified from aggregate data are discussed. The last phase of this intensive workshop is about imagining what our church could look like.

Workshop 4: How do we get there?

This workshop is about priorities and specific plans—both for the church and for the workshop team. It includes an opportunity for participants to reflect on the ways they hope to move forward in the spiritual journey. In the end, a clear plan and action steps should emerge, ready to share with the vestry and ultimately, the congregation. This planning is not so much about new programming or ministries as it is about a cultural shift that refocuses church life and ministry on spiritual growth.

We are excited about the Renewal Works program. We encourage everyone to complete a Spiritual Life Inventory which will be available starting September 16th. The higher the number of St. Francis parishioners completing the Spiritual Life Inventory the clearer picture we will have of the spiritual life at St. Francis.

Periodic Financial Summary

Here is a summary of the church's current financial status. This does not include any details, and is not a complete picture of the year, but serves as a dashboard so you can see if we are on track.

As you can see from this chart, which includes data from January through July 2018, we had slightly higher than budgeted pledge income for the period, slightly lower than budgeted other income, and higher than budgeted expenses, which leaves us below budget for the period. Though we are below budget currently, the treasureer and vestry believe we are still in a good position for the year. We continue to work to stay within our budget for the rest the year. Please continue to make your pledges to help us keep on track.

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Among the items discussed at its June 19th meeting, those of immediate concern to the parish are summarized below.

Security Camera Installation

We received a bid of \$7625.97 by Clear Connection for the installation of a security entrance system at the main doors to the office and the entrance to St. Francis Hall. The system includes two cameras, two microphones and three video monitors that would be installed at the parish administrator's desk, the rector's desk and the business manager's desk. These allow one to view and speak with the person at the door and to unlock the door remotely. We began locking our doors about two years ago, at the request of SAES. The Vestry voted unanimously to approve the installation of the security system that will be funded from the Capital Campaign account.

Outdoor Sign Update

An architect is working pro bono on the preliminary design of an electronic sign that will include a center brick or stone piece with our name on it approximately six feet wide, and two wings that will be approximately seven feet wide and feature the screens.

11:30 am Service in the Fall

Fr. Mark noted that attendance at this service has been declining since Easter Sunday, averaging 12 people per service. The Vestry shares Fr. Mark's concern that this sparsely-attended service is not a good introduction for newcomers. The Vestry discussed continuing to hold the service for those parishioners who are interested, but not advertise this service to the public. Ms. Baker suggested that a conversation with those who will be affected could be useful.

Vacation Bible School

Ms. Ford filed an electronic report about Missy Beall's summary of Vacation Bible School. There were 15 students, six teens that acted as superhero support, and 11 adults that participated in supporting roles. Two new families participated. What it means to be a superhero on Christ's team was communicated via questions posed by the Superhero news anchors and answers given by visiting capeless heroes.

Financial Report

Ms. Cuddapah stated that we have hit the summer slow down in pledge revenue versus budget YTD. Parishioners are encouraged to mail in pledge checks during the summer to help with cash flow.

Among the items discussed at its July 17th meeting, those of immediate concern to the parish are summarized below.

Glenolden House

We will be making an emergency replacement of the air conditioning system at Glenolden House, at a total cost of \$5390. Since the replacement is a capital expenditure, the Vestry voted unanimously to have the funds for the work come from the Capital Campaign rather than from the Property Maintenance budget which is already exhausted for the year.

Signage Update - Presentation

Karen Schneider, our Communications Director, and Joe Weber, of Shannon-Baum, a sign installer, presented materials showing options for an electronic sign at the corner of River and Counselman Roads. Mr. Weber stated that the LED portion of the sign is water-tight and will resist any possible vandalization. The sign will have a five-year warranty from Watchfire, the manufacturer, all of the LED parts are made in the U.S., and Watchfire keeps parts for 15 years (the typical lifespan of the signs), so any parts replacement is easily accomplished. The cost is approximately \$30,000-\$38,000 for a single-section, double-sided design that incorporates the LED portion into a brick monument. Afterward, the Vestry members went outside to the location where a sign would be placed. After extensive discussion, the Vestry voted unanimously to proceed with the design that incorporates the LED screen into a single-section monument.

Financial Report

Ms. Cuddapah stated that pledge income is improving, although still below budget by \$27,000. A large collection in the beginning of July is not yet reflected in the financial report. Again, we encourage parishioners to mail in pledge checks during the summer to help with cash flow. Ms. Cuddapah said that there were no extraordinary maintenance expenses in June, but repairs continue to be over budget and do not yet include the undercroft expenses. Overall, net income is \$53,000 under budget.

Portfolio Reports

On behalf of Mr. Hough, Fr. Mark reported that we have a committee of 12 people for the Renewal Works program for spiritual renewal of the parish. They will survey the entire parish about discernment. Mr. Alexander reported that the culmination of the Stewardship Campaign will be on October 21, and we will hold only two services on that Sunday, at 8 am and 10 am. Ms. Dolan reported that Fr. Mark and Fr. Mac will teach a Newcomers class on five consecutive Sundays, from September 16 through October 14. The class is open to all newcomers and required for those wishing to be confirmed, and suggested for newcomers wishing to transfer or be received into the parish.

On Saturday, July 7th, the Men of St. Francis combined with our Youth Group to put on a barbecue and play sports with the residents of the National Center for Children, Youth, and Families (e.g., Greentree Shelter). The Greentree Shelter is the only one in Montgomery County that keeps families together in a homeless shelter. Seven Men of St. Francis chopped tomatoes and watermelon, grilled cheeseburgers and hotdogs, and served ice cream treats for dessert. The youth group, meanwhile, entertained the kids and adults by playing baseball, football, and bocce. Approximately 30 residents were in the shelter, ranging from young babies to adults. The hamburger meat and buns were supplied by Fred Rosenthal of Jasper's and Mondrake's restaurants; we all agreed it was some of the best beef we've eaten. We all had so much fun they invited us back to hold a school kickoff party in early September. Many thanks to Dexter Ewell, Ken Hurdle, Keith Gardiner, Adam



Schneider, Leigh Alexander, and John Jasin of MSF. Also many thanks to Father Mac, Bryn, Valerie, Kate, Will, and Susan Dolan of the Youth Group.

Sunday School Fundraiser for Kondoa, Tanzania

Several years ago, St Francis was blessed to have two different Tanzanian priests at different times attend our church as they were studying at nearby Virginia Seminary. While here, they made friends among the congregation and participated in some of our services. Each returned to his own diocese after completing course work at

Virginia Seminary.

The first, James Almasi, was then elected bishop of his diocese, Masasi Diocese, and members of our church both individually and together with the Women of St. Francis and the Outreach Committee have helped Bishop Almasi with support for a boys' school and a community training program as well as his family needs including a means of transportation. Bishop Almasi and his diocese have been very grateful for our help over the years. We are thankful that in addition to a new relationship between the Masasi Diocese and the

Diocese of Montreal, St. John's Olney has recently been helping James in his education efforts.



The second priest, Given Gaula, returned to Tanzania and almost immediately started a doctoral program in New Zealand. After finishing there with an emphasis on St Luke's missionary efforts, he returned home and was assigned as a new bishop to the Diocese of Kondoa, which is one of the poorest missionary dioceses in Tanzania. This is where he is still working today, trying to build up believers in Christ in spite of political and religious difficulties. Given has a program under way to train women from the local villages in the basics of reading and writing so that they may be better equipped to obtain jobs and to work with the education of their own families.

As you may remember, proceeds from last year's Evening of the Arts were donated to Bishop Gaula for use in his school and training program. This year, we will again donate proceeds from our Evening of the Arts to the Diocese of Kondoa. Please support the Sunday School children in their efforts to entertain you while simultaneously raising funds for the children and the people of Kondoa. We hope you will make it a point to come to this wonderful event and help support this important effort.




