Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met on December 20, 2022, and January 17, 2023 to discuss matters pertinent to the operation and management of St. Francis. Highlights from those meetings include the following:

Finance Committee

The rector and wardens disbanded the Finance Committee, which Father Mark had created in 2017. The committee is not required by parish by-laws. The Vestry sees the Finance Committee, when re-established, as an advisory group to collaborate with Vestry members on the financial matters with input from the parish to guide these decisions. The Vestry stated that the Finance Committee had served an important function, and the parish has been fortunate to have many good and dedicated members. The rector and search committee are committed to developing guidelines for the committees work and recruiting members. It is expected that the new committee will be in place by April or May.

Tyler Maroulis was nominated and approved unanimously to serve as the new church treasurer. Marybeth Krajcik, the new business manager is in place and understanding the church's needs. The Vestry wishes to thank the outgoing Finance Committee members for their time and commitment to the Vestry and St Francis Church.

Vestry Size Quorum

An amendment to the church's by-laws reducing the size of the vestry and the quorum will be presented at the annual meeting. It will be proposed that the number of Vestry members be reduced from 13 to 11 and the quorum from 9 to 6 Vestry members. This would be consistent with the overall size of our parish and would address the challenge of finding sufficient candidates.

HVAC Work

The contractor RSC is currently 80-85% complete.

The following is work currently in place:

New rooftop air cooled chiller set in place with water and electrical connections complete.

New rooftop heat pumps/condensers set in place for the three (3) new Air Handler Units (AHU).

New AHU's 2.1 and 2.2 within St. Francis Hall are complete and operational.

Demolition of AHU 1 within the Cribery is complete.

Installation for new AHU 1 is on-going.

Wiring for HVAC system controls is complete.

Piping insulation for rooftop and mechanical room piping is on-going.

Georgetown Hill

The GHS has indicated that they would like to lease additional space, however our fire alarm system is outdated and not up to code. Once the fire alarm system is updated this conversation will be continued. The school has tentatively agreed to share one-half of the fire alarm system costs.

Outgoing Vestry Members

The Vestry of St Francis is thankful for the dedication of the following outgoing members: Ms Renita Ford, Mr. Leigh Alexander, Ms. Carol Tutura, Mr. Norm Barker, and Ms Cathy Cudapah as our treasurer.

Life is Blooming at St. Francis

Dear Saint Francis Friends,

Life is blooming at Saint Francis! This Spring has seen a whirlwind of preparations for Baptisms, First Communions, and Confirmations. Visitors have been joining us almost every week, and our regional MERCY youth group has grown from just a handful of teens each week to having 20 or more at many events. And all manner of wonderful events and practical projects are moving forward.

But numbers only tell a part of the story, and often not the most important part. More encouraging to me are those of you who reach out with deep faith questions, who ask to pray, or who take up a new faith practice for the first time out of a desire to grow. Something special is happening at Saint Francis.

It is so welcome to see it, especially since for many of us, the last few years have felt like a long Lent (an especially penitential Lent). People retreated from common life, anger and polarization drove wedges between family members and friends. Our congregation has lost a number of beloved members due to the pandemic's effects on health and area demographics.

And yet, we see signs of hope and new life around us.

In John's Gospel, Jesus says, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. He who loves his life loses it, and he who hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life." When a seed is planted, or a grain falls into the earth, it lies dormant for a time, and then it starts to grow below the surface before poking up where we can see it. Jesus remained in the tomb from Friday to Sunday before the disciples really understood what God was doing in this great mystery.

The seeds we have planted are the selfless sacrifices made by members and staff of the St. Francis community, who have served, prayed, and worked, not out of some selfish goal, but in gratitude for all that God has done for us. When we begin to die to ourselves and our own agendas, new life in the Holy Spirit has a way of blooming around us. And if we even give up our fear of death to God, we find a bold new life that shares in God's overwhelming abundance-- both in this life, and the next. Christ's death and resurrection takes hold of us, and the fruit of His sacrifice blooms in our lives.

So, dear friends, keep giving of yourselves sacrificially, loving with abandon, and dying to your own fears and your desire to control the Spirit's work, so that new shoots will keep sprouting in Potomac, MD. May this Lent and Eastertide be a season of deep renewal and grace in each of your lives.



Internationally known Carillonneur





He has now held that position for thirty years. Mr. Widmann graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and completed his Master of Music degree from Towson University in 2011. In 2021-2022, Mr. Widmann studied for his diploma at the Royal Carillon School "Jef Denyn" in Mechelen, Belgium. In addition to his Sunday recitals, he retired in 2021 from Frederick County Public Schools where he was a General/Vocal Music teacher. He is also the Organist and Choir Master for St. Francis Episcopal Church in Potomac, Maryland. Mr. Widmann became a Carillonneur member of the Guild of Carillonneurs

in North America in 1996, and is a past member of the National Board of that organization. He maintains an active concert schedule, and has played frequently in the US, along with recitals in Belgium, France, Germany, Switzerland, Spain, Portugal, the Netherlands, England, Canada, and the Netherlands Antilles. He lives in Frederick with his wife and sometimes their two grown children.

Reaching Out Our Faith at Work in Our Community

Outreach Partner Profile: Samaritain Ministry



Our financial and volunteer support of St Francis' Outreach activities directly assists our neighbors, as Christ has entreated us to do. The following is our spotlight on Samaritan Ministry, one of our 14 Outreach partners.

Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington (hereafter SMGW) empowers individual program participants in the Washington, D.C. area whose goal is to transition from poverty to living wage employment and a life of greater promise. SMGW achieves this through their Next Step a program, pioneered as the only non-residential case management program in Greater Washington when it began in 1986. SM's mission begins by empowering their program participants to identify goals and next steps to meet those goals. This includes cultivating capacities and practices to overcome barriers to accomplishing the life goals they identify. In doing so, SM engages their partners (US!) to support SM's impactful efforts in multiple ways with our time, talent, and treasure. In the recent past, 54 percent of those who began SMGW's STRIVE employment training successfully entered the workforce and retained their jobs (pre-pandemic, SMGW's STRIVE placement/retention numbers were around 75 - 80%). .

SMGW maintains four offices in D.C., one in Arlington, VA, and one in Silver Spring, MD. Their principal objectives are coaching participants to identify goals and next steps in affordable housing, education, health and food security, and employment readiness, training, and career development. Specific offerings include STRIVE job readiness training, prep for the General Equivalency Degree test, basic digital literacy, as well as general

literacy and mathematics training. SMGW also provides guidance so that participants can obtain public health benefits, and on a select basis, foodstuffs, gift cards, toiletries, and direct financial support.

Demographically, 96% percent of SMGW's clients are Black (African American, West Indian, or African). Latinos, Caucasians and Asian and Pacific Islanders round out their other support recipients. 54 percent are male, 46 percent are female. In terms of age, approximately 25% percent are 18 - 40; 30% are 41-55; 25% are 56 - 65, and the remaining 20% are 66 or older. Their personal challenges range from chronic psychological issues, homelessness, and recovery from substance dependence.

Nearly 75 percent of Samaritan's staff members are volunteers who contributed more than 13,023 volunteer hours as of June 2020. Staff members assist our neighbors by serving as caseworkers, workshop leaders, resume coaches, front office coordinators and in a variety of other critical roles.























Praying for Renewal in Kentucky's Holy Land

You can spot them easily on maps of nationwide religious membership, three Catholic counties in central Kentucky, amid a sea of evangelicals. Rural Nelson, Marion, and Washington counties are known collectively as "the Holy Land," and their rolling hills are dotted with hamlets called St. Mary, Calvary, and Loretto. About a third of their combined population of 70,000 are Roman Catholics, the highest percentage in the Southeast outside greater Miami and Louisiana's Cajun country.

It's a land of front-yard statues of Our Lady of Lourdes and pickup trucks lined up for Saturday night vigil Masses, high-vaulted 19th-century churches surrounded by well-tended cemeteries and flanked by schools rebuilt for baby boomers 75 years ago. There were once seven religious communities based in the Diocese of Louisville, most of them here in the Holy Land. Gethsemani Abbey, the former home of Thomas Merton, still welcomes many pilgrims, as does the Basilica of St. Joseph in Bardstown, completed in 1819 as the first Catholic cathedral west of the Alleghenies, and decorated with paintings sent by Pope Leo XII and King Louis Philippe of France.

Bardstown is more famous these days for its bourbon, and you could fit the basilica inside one of the industry's seven-story black warehouses without too much trouble. But here, too, the Catholic roots run deep.

The first group of Catholics to settle the region in 1785, 25 families from southern Maryland, were led by Basil Hayden. He was the pioneer distiller of the region (Old Grand-Dad is named for him), but also built its first Catholic church on his farm, Holy Cross, which is the only going concern in the Marion County hamlet to which it gives its name. The Beams (as in Jim Beam) of nearby Clermont were pious Catholics as well, and legend has it that when Father William Byrne founded St. Mary's College, the first of its kind west of the Alleghenies in 1819, in an abandoned distillery, he used whiskey crates for classroom benches and desks.



I discovered the region while researching my family history, as I am descended from old Maryland Catholics. These English recusants flocked to the colony during its brief interlude as a refuge for Catholics in the mid-17th century. My ancestors gradually made their way west after the colony's 1689 "Protestant Revolution" banned Catholic worship, and tensions about the Hannoverian succession led to crackdowns on loyalty to the Catholic Stuarts.

One ancestor of mine built a large chapel in his log home as a way around laws against public worship. Some sent children back to Europe to train as Jesuit priests and to join convents. Another was associated with a group arrested for firing a volley in front of the State House on the Old Pretender's birthday in 1716, when state law banned Catholics from owning firearms. He responded by naming his daughter in honor of the would-be king and his consort a year later. The name "Jacoba Clementina" was proudly passed down through the family for several generations.

None of my relatives were part of Basil Hayden's first band, but some joined parties that followed soon after, and Kentucky and Maryland cousins kept in contact for generations, often intermarrying, or resettling in each other's communities to work or be cared for in old age. A first cousin many generations removed, Catherine Spalding, was the foundress of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth, a teaching order founded in Bardstown in 1812. Made superior at 19, she ruled the order for 54 years.

The Kentucky Catholics became remarkable institution-builders, founding in a few decades — besides St. Mary's College — a seminary to train missionaries, several convents, orphanages for boys and girls, and dozens of parishes and schools at a time when central Kentucky was still on the edge of the frontier. They built their churches in brick, generally in a Neoclassical style modeled on the Cathedral of the Assumption in Baltimore. The oldest were adorned with age-blackened Baroque paintings, whose journeys over mountain footpaths or down the Ohio River on keelboats were surely once the stuff of campfire yarns.

Their proclivity for fiery tipples and horseracing aside, the Kentucky Catholics probably most resembled America's

other once-persecuted, culture-building religious group, the Mormons of Utah. Years of opposition from the surrounding Protestant culture confirmed their sense of a just cause and helped cast a vision for the kind of society they could build, if their neighbors would just give them space to do it. Placing a high value on education, they fostered gifted leaders, and hundreds dedicated their lives to helping their new institutions thrive.

I spent a day exploring Nelson, Marion, and Washington counties in December, after attending the Louisville wedding of The Living Church's former executive director, Christopher Wells. I visited several churches and walked long lines of headstones carved with family names I knew well from my research: Elder, Spalding, Mudd.

After vigil Mass on New Year's Eve, I chatted with the pastor of a church that had been served almost 200 years ago by a distant cousin. Like me, he was a Marylander, but most of his ministry had been in the Holy Land. He was a few months short of retirement, and wasn't sure how the diocese would staff his two remote churches once he stepped down.

"They call it the Holy Land," he told me, "that's what it used to be, anyway." His two parish schools had closed decades ago, when vocations ran short at the convents and the local farmers just couldn't afford to pay lay teachers. The church buildings were still tended lovingly, and there were a few dozen families in the pews that Saturday night, in a village with an official population of 144—not all that bad, considering. But his parish was graying, with few children, offerings were down, and there were serious doubts about the future.

"What happened? Was it the abuse scandals?" I asked. "No," he responded, "furthest thing from it. Just laziness — not teaching the faith to their children, not showing up. I guess they just didn't know what they had."

I hope the well-meaning — if rather weary — priest won't have the last word on the Catholics of Kentucky's Holy Land. As a leader in another church blessed with its own glorious past and struggling with similar forms of decline and forgetfulness, I can hardly cast stones. These days, at least, old Maryland Catholics and Anglicans have more in common than our ancestors would have guessed.

In church after church, I gave thanks for those who had brought the gospel to these communities, facing the hazards bravely, inspiring dedication and generosity in those who gathered in them. I also prayed for renewal, that the sons and daughters of Kentucky would fill the convent stalls and seminary desks again, that parish schools would reopen, and leaders be raised up to tackle today's problems: joblessness and opiate addiction.

Lent summons God's lazy people, those who "just don't know what they had." Joel speaks to weary Israel, "Rend your hearts and not your garments. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love." God, who justly condemns our indifference, also promises new life to those who repent. "I will pour out my spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions."

Once the Spirit was poured out, and a 19-year-old girl became mother superior, cathedrals were raised in the wilderness, and boys learned the faith while sitting on whiskey crates. Who's to say he can't do it again?

Sacred Space is a prayer resource that facilitates daily prayer and can be especially helpful both as an occasional prayer resource, and as a way to cultivate a regular prayer practice. https://www.sacredspace.ie/content/about-sacred-space

Sacred Space publishes daily prayer books, which include new editions annually for Advent, Lent, or the entire year. The Sacred Space website has many additional prayer and retreat resources, and it includes links to the daily prayer App or Podcast, "Pray As You Go". "Pray as You Go" daily prayers are usually 8-10 minutes in a format that guides you through each session of prayer.

It is difficult to convey how well the "Pray As You Go" recordings (and other Sacred Space Resources) facilitate spending time with God in prayer, but they really do, in ways that are beautiful and transformative!




Lenten Appeal Announcement

We continue to carefully manage our budget, making necessary expenditures on our property and systems, and planning for upcoming expenses. The vestry and financial committee work hard to schedule the many necessary property repairs so our cash flow is not negatively impacted.

As always, we rely on parishioner pledges and donations to fund our office operations, ministries, and programs, and we encourage you to continue to support St. Francis Episcopal Church. As you can see, our pledge receipts were significantly lower than budgeted this period, and our expenses were slightly higher than budgeted. The finance committee created our annual budget based on the amounts pledged by parishioners during our pledge campaign, and we rely on that income to meet our expenses. 


