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

# Rector's Message

"The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him: the spirit of wisdom, and of understanding, the spirit of counsel, and of fortitude, the spirit of knowledge, and of godliness. And he shall be filled with the spirit of the fear of the Lord." Isaiah 11:2-3.



The age of the Messiah, the Bible's prophets stress, would be an age of the Spirit. The Holy Spirit is active within the people of Israel in the Old Testament, descending on judges, kings, and prophets to equip them with wisdom and courage. But in days to come, when God came among his people as their true King, defeating the power of evil and making a new covenant, they taught that the Holy Spirit would be present and active in abundance, a gift for all.

Isaiah 11 describes the Messiah as a new king rising from David's line. The Spirit would rest on him--remaining eternally to fill him with powerful gifts. Seven of these are enumerated: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, godliness, and the fear of the Lord. They relate to our ability to comprehend the things of God and to choose wisely and decisively about what we should do.

Jesus was conceived in the womb of his mother "by the power of the Holy Spirit," as we say in the Creed (c.f. Luke 1:35), and the Spirit descended upon him at his baptism to mark him out as the one with whom God the Father was "well-pleased" (Mark 1:10-11). We see the Holy Spirit's presence within Jesus in his deep understanding of others, his power to heal, and his faithful courage in fulfilling his vocation.

After his resurrection, Jesus bestowed the Spirit on the apostles (John 20:22), and the Holy Spirit came down even more dramatically at Pentecost, when St. Peter proclaimed that all who received the Gospel with faith and were baptized would be filled with the same spirit, abounding in the long-promised gifts that showed that the final age of the world, the time of God's transforming presence, had come (Acts 2:17ff). Later, we see the Spirit working through the apostles as they design a structure for the church and make decisions about its mission (Acts 6, 15).

All those who belong to Christ share in his Spirit. The Spirit works in us to help us know the truth about God and ourselves and to believe it fully. He equips us with gifts for ministry, and fills us with virtues that reveal that "God is at work in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure" (Phil. 2:13).

We believe that the Holy Spirit fills all who are baptized, and indeed, one of the prayers of the Baptismal liturgy paraphrases the great prophecy of Isaiah 11 (I have bolded the key words):

Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an **inquiring** and **discerning** heart, the **courage** to will and to persevere, a spirit to **know** and to **love** you, and the gift of **joy** and **wonder** in all your works.

However, the Holy Spirit is also stirred up and renewed in a special way at Confirmation, where we receive "strength for the battle" of Christian living as adults, as a famous medieval phrase has it.

Confirmation originated in the special blessing given by a bishop at the close of the baptismal service in the early church. Bishops, as successors of the apostles, receive a unique power to bestow the Holy Spirit on God's people (this is also why they ordain candidates for Holy Orders). They also connect us tangibly with the Church's ministry across the world and throughout the generations.

As the church grew, it became impossible for bishops to preside at each baptism, and the practice arose of reserving confirmation for a later age, when those who had been baptized before could affirm the promises once made for them after a suitable course of instruction. Life becomes more complicated on the cusp of adulthood. We face new temptations and make choices that often determine our course of life. Powerful prayer for the Spirit's gifts at this moment seemed especially fitting.

In the Episcopal Church, those who were not confirmed as young people receive confirmation as they become members of a local church. I have often seen that the decision to come back to church after time away or to commit to a congregation with a distinctive form of prayer and discipleship comes at a time of transition. We have children or struggle through a serious illness or the death of a loved one, and through that process, our hearts are opened, and we feel a new longing for God's presence and life among his people. The baptismal faith we affirm is a public testimony to what we have come to know, and the gift of His Spirit through the bishop's prayer strengthens us for the joys and challenges that lay ahead.

Bishop Mariann will be visiting St. Francis on Sunday, December 17, as she does about every three years, and she will administer confirmation during her visit (as well as receiving into the Episcopal Church those who were confirmed by a bishop before-Roman Catholic and Orthodox Christians). There will be opportunities for youth and adults to prepare for confirmation this fall. If you are new at St. Francis, expect to receive a personal invitation to join in. But maybe you have been worshiping here for many years, but have never received this special grace. Confirmation is for you as well, an invitation to the age of the Spirit, to be filled with the gifts and graces God shares out on all who belong to him.



MERCY Youth, Parents, and Outreach Heroes have been busy this summer!

Amazing teens and parents jumped in to work at the Manna Food Bank last month-- always a favorite activity! Volunteers sorted for two hours, finding some very strange and long-expired donations! The teens want you to know that when you you are asked give to food in food drives, please don't use the opportunity to donate unwanted expired foods out of your pantry. The hungry deserve better from us.

Two weeks later, a group of 20 volunteers went to the DC Central Kitchen in Washington D.C. It was amazing to see this organization that trains people in food service. We were so impressed with the professionalism and kindness of these men and women, all of whom came to DC Central Kitchen from difficult situations that made it difficult to find employment—a criminal record, victims of human trafficking and abuse, and all kinds of other challenges! The food made there goes to local markets and shops ("food deserts" where finding fresh food would be otherwise impossible), after school programs, homeless shelters, soup kitchens. #### Outreach Partner Profile - Manna Food Center

The mission of Manna Food Center is to eliminate hunger in Montgomery County through food distribution, education and advocacy. Its vision is to build a community where people at all times have access to nutritious food.

When Manna opened its doors in 1983 in a vacant elementary school, it began with a single pledge of \$3,100 and a donation of 16,000 pounds of food. At that time it served a few hundred people. Today, Manna distributes approximately 12,000 pounds of food daily and serves more then 37,000 people.

Food insecurity in Montgomery County: One in four people in Montgomery County are estimated to experience food insecurity. One in three elementary school children qualify for the county's Free and Reduced Meals program. Twenty percent of county seniors live below the self sufficiency standard. The largest of Manna's food distribution programs are Food for Families and Smart Sacks. Manna offers an average of 3,300 families approximately 45 pounds of perishable and nonperishable food each month. Manna's Food for Families program begins with pickups from about 40 grocery stores and farmers markets across the county. Many community groups, both civic and religious, donate food. St. Francis, for example, collects shelf-stable items several times a year for Manna. Manna and a large cadre of volunteers then sort produce and combine fresh food with shelf stable items for delivery to a number of satellite distribution centers around the county. This operation takes place daily at Manna's warehouse in Gaithersburg.

School-based Programs. Nearly 45 percent of the county's public school students are enrolled in free or reduced cost meals at school. Manna supplements this assistance by offering weekend bags and a pantry program at various schools. Sustained healthy eating is encouraged through educational materials and recipes distributed throughout the school year. Manna's Smart Sacks Weekend Bag Program's goal is to supplement student's and their families' meals over the weekend during the school year. Each bag contains nutritious staples such as whole grains, lean proteins, low- or no-sodium canned vegetables and fruits, and more. Manna also operates pantries at schools, which offer fresh produce and nutritious, shelf-stable items.

Manna's Impact in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022 includes:

29,704 individuals supported (Food for Families)

4,241 students supported (Smart Sacks)

85,992 bags of weekend food distributed elementary school partners

32 pantries at schools supporting 1,622 households

3.8 million pounds of food distributed

810,842 pounds of food donated

174,287 pounds of fresh produce distributed

3 farmers markets, 32 farms donate produce

Manna's mission to end hunger in Montgomery County could not be realized without the help of its dedicated volunteers, who sort, pack and distribute food at the Gaithersburg warehouse. 






# **Bible Study**



# A profile of "Mr. Thai (by Chuck Wilson)

Hoa Thieu Thai was born in 1949 in Bac Lieu, Vietnam. At age 15 he moved to Saigon where he apprenticed then served as a shoemaker. He left Vietnam in 1979 because the North Vietnamese had overrun the South and were harassing Southern people and businesses. Thai had married his childhood sweetheart Maria and their first child Kim was a baby. They set sail from Saigon with some 500 others. Once at sea they were attacked by pirates from Thailand who took their possessions and attacked many and killed some.

Following a string of perilous adventures they wound up in Singapore where after a short time they were brought to the US by a Protestant church near Washinton, DC. They got Thai work in a shoemaking shop in DC staffed by women who ridiculed him because he spoke no English and because he produced shoes 3 times faster than any of them! He left after a short stay and got a good job at an auto-parts warehouse. He also worked weekends tending his neighbors' yards. One such happened to be the sister-in-law of a St. Francis parishioner to whom she offered Thai's services when she had extended travel. That parishioner happened to be looking for a Sexton and thought Thai might help find him someone in the Vietnamese community. Thai agreed and asked to see St. Francis. They took an extended tour at the end of which Thai said, "when I start?". That was the beginning of three decades of great service.


Thai quickly learned the systems and intricacies of maintaining a well-run church. He had his ups and downs.

When a pipe bust in the Undercroft and filled it with several inches of water, it was Thai who waded in, drained off the water off and refurbished the rooms to a better state than before the flood.

When construction of the building addition of church offices, many new classrooms and the library and music room was underway Thai kept all other systems running so that parishioners generally experienced normalcy. When the Glenolden property was acquired it was Thai who re-habilitated the house and property. And Thai always made sure the Rectory was well maintained. In short, Thai took great care of St. Francis Church for 30 years and parishioners loved him. They planted a flowering tree near the front of the church in his honor and gave him a great send off when he retired.

Thai, a Roman Catholic, was asked what it meant to work in a Protestant environment for so many years. He said "Our almighty God is everywhere". That is Hoa Thieu Thai. God bless him!

#### Greetings to all at St Francis!

I am writing to you on July 28th, as we bask in an Excessive Heat Warning from the National Weather Service for the Potomac area, with a heat index approaching 110 degrees. It will not be long, however, before we start to notice the days are getting shorter, the nights are a little bit cooler, and our children (or for many of us, our grandchildren) are returning to return to school.

Our internal clocks will tell us that this is the start of a "new year," not one that is on any published calendar, but one that has signaled a time of change for us from our earliest years when, as young children, we would head off to school. We know that it will not be long before the leaves are turning and then falling, the days are crisp and the nights cool, and the Thanksgiving holiday and Christmas season are just around the corner.

With this change in season also comes our Stewardship season at St. Francis. Our gifts to St. Francis of the gifts that the Lord has entrusted to us for that time when we are here on Earth – our time, our talents, and our treasure – are what allows St. Francis to survive and thrive. Without them, there would not be a St. Francis. On behalf of the Vestry and the Clergy, I want to state at the outset that we are grateful for all your gifts of your time, talent and treasure to St. Francis – to worship our Father and to support our many ministries.

For many, the word "Stewardship" is only about money, but as we enter this "new year" come this fall, it is important to remember that our time and our talents are just as important to the life of the Parish – a parish with only money would not be much of a parish at all. So, as we approach this season, I encourage each of us to reflect on all that we are given and of that which we are given, what we can give back to St. Francis – not just money but our efforts and services that are so essential to a thriving parish.





To be clear, however, your financial support is essential to St. Francis. During Stewardship season, we are called upon to prayerfully remind ourselves of God's blessings to us by committing to support our church financially.

At the very beginning of October, each member of St Francis will receive materials in the mail regarding our Stewardship effort. When October comes, we request that you pledge to support St Francis financially throughout 2024. (If you are new and don't receive anything come October, please let us know.) Your financial support to St Francis enables us to advance our worship of Christ and all that St. Francis does. From enabling our youth Christian education, to keeping our church warm in the winter and cool in the summer, and supporting our Outreach ministries, your financial contributions will support the vitality of our Parish. Indeed, our pledges are our personal commitment to help St. Francis meet its financial obligations throughout the year.

Any pledge requires deep prayer and consideration. This reflection oftentimes reminds us of our many blessings we are given, and the phrase we say during our church service, "from thine own have we freely given." When we say that, we recognize that what we consider to be ours is actually a gift to us from our Lord. Our pledge is an acknowledgment of our thanks for the blessings that we have received and an effort to return to His work a small portion of that which we are given.

As we approach this Stewardship season, I ask that each of us reflect on all that we are given as temporary stewards on Earth, and of that, what we can give back to St. Francis.

Fr. Mark gave the invocation.

#### **Bible Study**

Ms. Oleson led the Bible Study. She read Psalm 16 as a meditation and Matthew 6:21, "Where your treasures are, there your heart is also." She posed a question: What are your treasures — without God these can be meaningless. Ms. Oleson recalled a very serious illness she had several years ago, and how she experienced God's presence in the hospital.

### Rector's Report (attached)

#### Georgetown Hill School (GHS) Space Rental

Fr. Mark said that Peter Cromwell, CEO, had presented GHS's additional rental space requests, which include the Music Room, a Closet in St. Francis Hall, and the Cribbery. Fr. Mark said that the most recent Lease Amendment would serve as the model for the new rental agreement with GHS. The school plans to take possession of the rental spaces in July 2023.

The Vestry discussed the disposable stage, which was left when St. Andrews vacated its space several years ago. The stage is stored in one of the spaces that GHS wants to rent. With the increase in the number of children in the parish, the stage may be needed when the children host events for the church, although the stage is heavy and requires several people to assemble and disassemble it, and the church nave has proven to be better for staging the children's presentations. No one objected to disposing of the stage.

#### Posting Vestry Minutes and Financial Reports On-Line

Fr. Mark said that there had been a request that Financial Reports be posted to the Church Website (in addition to Vestry Minutes), which are already posted there. There was not consensus to make this change, and it was noted that Annual Financial Reports are shared at the time of the Annual Meeting, and monthly reports can be supplied on request.
